4	The Council of the City of Moundsville met in Regular Session in the Council
5	Chambers on August 16, 2022 at 6:00 P.M.
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7	Meeting was called to order by Mayor Judy Hunt.
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9	Invocation by Councilman Randy Chamberlain.
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11	City Clerk Hewitt called the roll and the following Councilpersons were in
12	attendance: Chamberlain, DeWitt, Saunders, Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw, D. Wood
13	and Mayor Hunt. Absent: Wallace. Also present were City Manager Healy, City
14	Clerk Hewitt, Finance Director Ankrom, Secretary Scarbin, Chief Mitchell and
15 16	City Attorney White.
17	MINUTES:

19	Regular Council Meeting of August 1, 2022.
20	Councilman Chamberlain moved to approve the minutes of the regular council
21	meeting of August 1, 2022, seconded by Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw. Motion carried
22	unanimously.
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24	GENERAL PUBLIC HEARING:
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26	Presentation by Delegate Charlie Reynolds to the Moundsville Fire
27	Department.
28	Delegate Charlie Reynolds presented the Moundsville Fire Department with a
29 30	\$1,000.00 check for children's events.
31	Presentation by Travis Blosser, Executive Director of the WV Municipal
32	League, to City Manager Healy & the City of Moundsville.
33	WV Municipal League Executive Director Travis Blosser presented City Manager
34	Healy with the Quiet Strength Award, also presented City Manager Healy and City
35	of Moundsville Council with the All Star Community Award, for the renovation of
36	East End Park.
37	
38	* Vivian Taylor, 115 Jefferson Avenue, expressed how upset she is that nothing is
39	being done with properties located on both sides of her house. One is partially
40	burned from the house beside it that caught on fire. The other has a large hole on

- the side on the second floor. She said she keeps her property well maintained and
- 2 should not have to live like this. Pigeons are going inside the houses as well as
- 3 raccoons and other varmints. Not to mention the high grass & weeds.

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Councilwoman DeWitt suggested the city board up the openings so the pigeons and animal cannot get inside.

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CITY MANAGER ITEMS:

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- Report on Progress of New Municipal Building.
- 1. We had a Pre-Closing on the bonds last week, and the official closing is this
- 12 Thursday. The equity contribution of the city will be deposited into the
- construction account tomorrow. All bond proceeds will be in the account on
- 14 Thursday. The construction document and contract signing will be held Friday at
- 15 10:00 AM in Council Chambers.
- 16 2. I have received the names of a few people and/or companies who could be
- interested in an Owner's representative position. I am actively working to speak
- directly with these people to present to Council.
- 19 3. The tentative date for the ceremonial Groundbreaking is Thursday, September
- 8, at 4:00 PM. There will be a short program with comments from officials and the
- 21 general contractor. The groundbreaking will then take place with many
- 22 opportunities for photos. Personalized hard hats will be made for all Council
- 23 Members.

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City Manager Healy provided the following manager's report to council:

- Personnel
 - Fire Department had one candidate test at the last testing.
 - Police Department had one Corporal resign for other employment. Patrolman First Class Alex Carnahan was promoted to Corporal, effective August 15, 2020. Two openings currently exist, and testing will be held on September 10. Applications will be accepted until September 2.
- 1. The American Rescue Plan programs are in place, and as of yesterday, we have
- 34 approved thirty-six Homeowner Grants totaling \$162,182.13, five Non-Profit
- 35 Grants totaling \$25,000.00, and four Business Grants totaling \$20,000.00. We
- 36 have sixteen applications awaiting more information. Since we only have enough
- 37 funding for a maximum of seven more awards, we have stopped giving out
- 38 applications until we officially move more money into the category.

- 2. I was present last week at Riverfront Park to welcome the West Virginia
- 2 Firefighter's Association to Moundsville. Their annual convention was held, and
- 3 they chose Moundsville to host both of their social events. A parade was also held
- 4 on Wednesday evening.
- 5 3. Mixed glass is now being collected at the Recycling Center. A detailed list of
- 6 what is available and what is not is on our website and has been shared on
- 7 Facebook. Basically, all food and beverage jars and bottles are recyclable.
- 8 Remove the lids and wash out the containers. This past Saturday was the first day,
- 9 and we had seven vehicles come through with glass. The 2023 DEP Recycling
- application has been submitted and grants will be announced in the fall.
- 4. The 2022 Paving Program is relatively complete. Crews are currently working
- on raising the manholes and will be back to seal the edges.
- 5. Last week, I attended a luncheon sponsored by Project Best. This was a
- 14 community outreach luncheon that is being held in every county that is a part of
- 15 Project Best. Vice-Mayor Wood-Shaw also attended this event.
- 6. The Pre-Construction Meeting for the Fostoria Avenue Bridge Relocation
- 17 Project was held last Monday. During the work period of approximately 60 days,
- there will be a detour to Arlington Avenue. Fostoria Avenue will be closed from
- just beyond the Fostoria property entrance to Walnut Avenue.
- 7. The Bid Opening for the actual bridge project will be September 13th.
- 8. Work is on-going at the Extension intersection for construction of the new
- 22 welcome sign. That is the last of the three new signs to be erected. After the
- 23 installation, we will work with AEP to have an electric drop installed for lighting at
- the Route 2 southbound sign.
- 9. We are very close to having the bicycle rental program up and running.
- 26 Unfortunately, we are still waiting on a few equipment pieces on the bikes. The
- software set-up should be operational by the end of the week. While we are
- pushing to the end of summer, bikes should be up and running throughout all of the
- 29 fall and early winter months.
- 30 10. The Training for the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Planning Commission
- is scheduled for Wednesday, August 31, from 6-8 PM. All of Council members
- 32 are encouraged to attend.
- 11. Community Day is this Saturday, August 20, from 12-4, at the Riverfront
- Park. Hot dogs, chips, drinks, and ice cream treats will be provided at no charge.
- 35 Activities include inflatables, sand art, duck pond, sports corner, Boy Scout
- shooting range, Sno-Biz, balloon animals, music, kids fire safety house, and a
- 37 cardio drumming demonstration. I would like to thank my staff who works hard to

- pull this event together, and Superintendent Stocklask who greatly assists with
- 2 donations and planning. Everyone is welcome, so please come and enjoy the day.
- 3 12. As everyone here now knows, many of Council and I attended the West
- 4 Virginia Municipal League Conference in Morgantown the first week of August.
- 5 As we saw earlier in the evening, Moundsville gained two awards at the
- 6 Conference, likely the first ever. I want to thank the League for considering us,
- and especially to Executive Director Travis Blosser for the Quiet Strength Award.
- 8 I was also fortunate to participate in a panel on Community Infrastructure. My
- 9 discussion revolved around the revitalization of East End Park and the difficulties
- we encountered during the process of planning the City Building. Our goal to start
- hearing Moundsville's name statewide is coming to fruition. We need to keep it
- going. Thanks again to the Municipal League. Also, many sessions were
- interesting, especially those related to dilapidated properties, and land banks.
- 14 13. And, as more accolades keep coming our way, I was notified today that the
- Moundsville Water System was named Water System of the Year at the recent
- Rural Water Conference. Superintendent Terry Roberts called me today from
- vacationing in Florida to share the news. This is a huge honor, and it continues to
- bring Moundsville the recognition it deserves. I have invited Superintendent
- 19 Roberts to Council on September 6 to display and discuss this award.
- 20 Congratulations to the entire department and Water Board for this prestigious
- 21 honor.

- 22 14. Openings still remain on the Board of Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission,
- 23 Historic Landmarks, and the Building Commission. Please reach out to anyone
- that you think may be interested in applying and ask them to contact me.
- 26 Mayor Hunt asked council members if they had any questions for the City
- 27 Manager?
- * Councilman Saunders asked if South Highland Avenue was going to be paved
- 29 this year? Manager Healy said South Highland was the ninth street to be paved
- 30 however, funds were only available to pave eight.
- * Councilman Saunders asked if there were any citizens denied the ARP funding?
- 32 Manager Healy said there have been some that have been denied due to past due
- utility bills or citations. But it has been a small number.
- * Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw suggested when advertising for vacancies of boards and
- 35 commissions to add a sentence explaining what each board or commission entails.
- 36 Manager Healy will include the request.

- * Councilman Chamberlain asked if the Wednesday's training was going to be
- 2 recorded for future use? Manager Healy said that could be considered.
- 3 * Councilman Chamberlain said he was happy that City Manager Healy has some
- 4 leads on an Owner's Representative.

- Night held at the Riverfront Park had a great turnout. Approximately 200 people
- were in attendance.
- ^{*} Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw said several members of the Street Department
- employees thanked council for employee raises.
- * Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw moved to discuss in the Finance Sub Committee adding
- 27 more ARP funding into the Home Owner Assistance Grant, seconded by
- 28 Councilman Chamberlain. Motion carried unanimously.
- ^{*} Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw asked if Manager Healy was able to research the
- 30 possibility using more technology for council meeting packets? Manager Healy
- said he has looked at some of the software programs that provide online agendas
- 32 but will have more information with some potential cost for the sub-committee
- 33 meeting in September.
- * Vice Mayor Wood-Shaw reported speaking with a certified project manager who
- shared some information such as project managers are not on site five days a week
- from 7-3. They are on site for a certain number of hours and paid by the hour.
- 37 They are on location for monumental times to make sure things are going right
- during that process. She also said timing to obtain an Owners Representative is
- very short as they need time to look over plans and blue prints. Councilman

- 1 Chamberlain provided information determining the cost of an Owners
- 2 Representative based on the cost of the project that could be beneficial when hiring
- 3 an individual.
- * Councilman Chamberlain asked if the Health Department has authority to
- 5 address the pigeon problem at the property beside Mrs. Taylor? Manager Healy
- said the Health Department has no enforcement power concerning pigeons, but
- 7 they will assist the city if needed.

- 25 members of the Public Candidate Forum organized for the 2020 General Election.
